From The Principal's Desk



Math class will find the students recognizing ordinal numbers through tenth, using number lines, skip counting by 2's and 5's, and counting, writing and comparing numbers 11-20.

December is a fun month for arts and crafts. We will be making stockings ,parent gifts, cards, ornaments, gingerbread houses and other classroom decorations.

We are beginning our third unit in Scholastic Reading called Lights! Camera! Action! Each story will feature individuals working together as a team. We are continuing to improve our fluency as we read.

Our grammar lessons will be focusing on past tense verbs, plural nouns, and adjectives.

In Math, we will continue working on place value to one hundred. We will be using mental math to add tens and add ones. This will prepare us for adding two-digit numbers. Please continue to practice memorizing basic addition and subtraction facts with your child at home.

In Social Studies we will be extending our study of types of resources, producers, and consumers. We will be focusing on the difference between goods and services, along with how people work to earn money to purchase goods and services.

This month in science we will be continuing our study of food webs and what can cause changes in a food web.

This holiday season the second graders will be making decorations to hang on the Christmas tree at the hospital. May everyone enjoy a safe and happy holiday!

Third Grade News

The month of November just seemed to fly! In December, we will be learning about the Advent season and the Jesse Tree.

Third graders will be learning about voice in our writing workshop and then we will write about Christmas from a different point-of-view.

Our life science studies will end with a discussion about healthy habits and our earth science unit will begin with the topics of water and weather. Climate, ecosystem, and regions will be the key words in our new social studies unit, which will begin later in the month.

In math, we have just constructed our own graphs. We will be starting to talk about multiplication. Now would be a good time to break out those multiplication flash cards!

Story of the Candy Cane

According to the legend, there was a candy maker who wanted to invent a candy that was a witness to Christ. The result was the candy cane.

First of all he used a hard candy because Christ is the Rock of all ages.

- This hard candy was shaped so that it would resemble either a "J" for Jesus or a shepherd's staff.
- He made it white to represent the Purity of Christ.
- Finally a red stripe was added to represent the blood of Christ shed for the sins of the world and three thinner stripes for the stripes He received on our behalf when the Roman soldiers whipped Him.

Sometimes a green stripe is added as a reminder that Jesus is a Gift from God. The flavor of the candy is peppermint which is similar to hyssop. Hyssop is in the mint family and was used in the Old Testament for purification and sacrifice. Jesus is the Pure Lamb of God come to be a sacrifice for the sins of the world.

So the next time you see a candy cane, hear the Sermon it preaches: Jesus Christ, the Good Shepherd, is the Rock of all Ages who suffered and died for our sins.

Fourth Grade News

December is a short month for students, but our focus will be on preparation for the NYS ELA exam which will take place January 7th.

We have been practicing note taking and will continue note taking as well as writing short answer questions, moving onto longer answer questions, and then onto essay type questions in our Language Arts classes.

In Religion, we will continue learning the Ten Commandments and how the first three commandments teach us

to love God. In Social Studies we will learn about life in colonial New York. The student will get into multiplication and see how multiplication and division relate to each other in math.

We finished the study of animal adaptation, the ecosystem and now we will move onto earth science, the study of water cycle and weather in science.

Spelling will continue to challenge the students and the words continue to get harder.

We will read stories such as "The Desert Beneath the Sea", and "The Lost Lake" in reading.

In technology class the students will go into the computer room and continue to practice keyboarding.. We hope to see you at our Christmas Concert on Wednesday, December 12th.

5th Grade ELA:
Our December unit is titled; Voyagers. The stories in this unit include; The Bunyans, Ship, Homesick: My
Own Story, and Wilma
Unlimited. Throughout this unit, the students will be working on comprehension (understanding point of view, note taking, sequencing and understanding cause and ef-

fect) vocabulary and writing.

We will be reading Christmas stories, writing, and making crafts with our Kindergarten friends this month too.

5th Grade Math:
In chapter 6 we will begin our study of geometry: measuring and classifying angles, investigating polygons such as triangles and quadrilaterals before moving into symmetry and transformations. Please continue to work with your child on all math facts!

Technology: We are working on Type to Learn 3 for keyboarding. I continue to make great use of the Scholastic Website for my Grade 5 class-page. I hope you are logging onto the Scott Foresman web site, www.sfsuccessnet.com to take advantage of the math enrichment activities.

5th Grade Science: We are working on Chapter 3: Human Body Systems.

We are learning about the circulatory system, respiratory system, digestive

and urinary systems.

6th Grade Math: In math we begin our study of percent in chapter 7. In this chapter we will investigate: the meaning of percent, finding percent and using percent.

6th Grade Science: We are working on Chapter11: Earth's Resources. We will investigate renewable and nonrenewable resources, energy resources, fossils fuels and how to reduce the harmful effects of fossil fuels.

From the Classroom of Mrs. Burns

This month Sixth grade is preparing for our Christmas Concert as we practice our traditional sixth grade Nativity Scene.

In ELA we are focusing on preparations for the New York State ELA test which will be given on January 16th.

We are working on such concepts as plot, climax, foreshadowing, metaphors, similes, interpreting poetry, understanding rhyme, meter, irony, comparing and contrasting reading selections, etc... We are also writing essays and working with many genres.

We are continuing our study of Ancient Greece in Social Studies. We are also reviewing many of the areas in Ancient Mesopotamia as we study the Early Patriarchs of the Old Testament. We are preparing our Jesse Trees to share with the school during the Advent Season.

In technology we are learning to format font and insert saved pictures. Our culminating project will be using the poem, "Twas the Night before Christmas".

In fifth grade religion we are learning about the Old Testament Bible characters found on the Jesse Tree. They will be studied in detail in sixth grade.

We just finished taking the New York State Test in Social Studies. The fifth graders seem to have done very well. We are now continuing on in our study of American History.

Giving of yourself is one of the best gifts you give. Whether it is at Christmas or any other day of the year. Here are some ideas for ways that you can give by yourself or as a family.


- The Giving Tree at Church—Just pick a name and buy a gift for someone who is in need.
